ETHS Regional Career Pathway Certifications

The East Troy High School CTE Department is proud to announce that they received Regional Career Pathway certifications in the areas of Construction, Digital Technology, and Business Administration/Finance. The Wisconsin Regional Career Pathways (RCP) approach is a statewide effort to deliver high-quality career pathways in high schools that reflect the needs and vision of a regional collaborative group of employers, education, and economic and workforce development.

For schools to become eligible for these certifications, they must meet the following requirements:

- Taking a sequence of aligned courses,
- Earning an industry-recognized credential,
- Enrolling in dual college credit classes,
- Participating in career-based and workbased learning experiences, and
- Accessing related Career and Technical Education (CTE) student organizations

There are several benefits to the Regional Career Pathways. For high school students, regional career pathways align education and training with the needs of the local job market, provide a range of postsecondary options, result in a high school diploma with at least one industry-recognized credential, and help students enter or advance within an occupation.

For schools, career pathways provide a specific ACP plan for occupations that are in demand in Wisconsin. This allows schools to focus on student and curriculum activities with input and support from regional employers and higher education.

For employers, regional career pathways make partnerships with a greater number of schools possible. This allows employers to shape the future talent pipeline, foster young talent, and highlight local career opportunities across an entire region.

Gateway V.O.I.C.E. Mini Grant Awards

Several of our ETHS staff members put in extra time and effort to apply for the Gateway VOICE grants. Together these grants have earned approximately \$42,777 to support our dual credit programs!

Middle School Outdoor Reading Garden Project







This past fall our East Troy Middle School received a grant from the National Resources Foundation of Wisconsin. Led by Tracey Gross, ETMS Library Assistant, the grant awarded funds that were used to create an outdoor reading area for our students, teachers, and community to enjoy.

In September, twenty-eight yards of soil were delivered and shaped into two large berms. Seventh grade Agriculture students were introduced to Bob Kugach, Master Gardener, who volunteered many hours to instruct students on planting and maintaining perennials. Students planted nearly two hundred perennials and afterwards, five yards of leaf mulch were applied as the top layer. ETHS Agriculture students then edged the berms and later our ETHS Botany class planted one hundred and sixty spring bulbs. As spring approaches, the remaining funds will be used to plant at least two trees.

By late May and beyond, we anticipate students will enjoy reading and learning under the dappled shade of trees while gazing among colorful spring bulbs and perennials. Students from the East Troy Middle and High Schools will be maintaining the perennial berms and trees so this was a great learning project to benefit our current AND future students.

Prairie View & Middle School Students Compete in Math Meet

Many 5th through 8th graders recently participated in the Southern Lakes Advanced Learner Network MegaMath Meet. East Troy Middle School and Prairie View students hosted our neighbors from Palmyra-Eagle to participate in five events which included individual and team events, a fun ice breaker, and a pizza party.

A total of 29 regional districts coordinated with their neighboring districts and participated in these events simultaneously, to have a fun and friendly math competition that recognized math talent and engaged learners. Scores were submitted and compared against peers when all was completed.

From 2020 Referendum to 2022-23 Budget Planning

Similar to predicting the weather based off current climate information, our East Troy Community School District will use current economic information in order to predict future budgets. Also similar to the weather, the accuracy of these forecasts is never a guarantee. Circumstances outside of our control can change, causing discrepancies between predictions and reality. This discrepancy increases the further you look into the future. It is always the hope that any discrepancy will be in the positive direction and for the benefit of our district, but best case scenarios do not always come true. Case in point, the difference in predictions seen from our November 2020 forecast compared to the current April 2022 forecast, are worse.

Based on the revenue limit formula, projections prior to the 2021 Referendum indicated compounding structural deficits of \$800,000, \$1.4 million, \$1.6 million, \$1.9 million, and \$2.3 million over the next five years, respectively, in order to support the maintenance of current programming, services and staffing in future years. A graph of this projection (created in November 2020) is shown to the right.


Since the Referendum did not pass, \$800,000 in permanent reductions (graphed in blue) were made for the 2021-22 budget and beyond. Without additional funding, another \$600,000 (graphed in red) in permanent reductions were expected for the 2022-23 school year and beyond. This graph shows a snapshot of the amount of permanent reductions predicted for each year in order to maintain a balanced budget.

Fast forward to April 2022, however, and we see that predictions have changed. Due to the enrollment not restoring in 2020 (100 student loss), a \$0/\$0 revenue limit and per pupil biennial budget, and inflation, our current projections indicate compounding structural deficits of \$1.6 million, \$2.0 million, \$2.4 million, \$3.0 million, and \$3.5 million over the next five years, respectively, in order to support the maintenance of current programming, services and staffing in future years.

Projected Deficits Compounding by Year to Support Current Programming, Services, and Staffing (Created April 2022)



The graph to the left shows the updated predictions with the completed permanent reduction of \$800,000 shown in blue. For the 2022-23 school year, there is a total deficit predicted of \$1.6 million. Of that amount, \$400,000 comes from positions added for district action plans, health insurance renewal and CPI higher than original projections. Currently we plan to permanently reduce \$800,000 from the 22-23 school year and balance the remaining \$800,000 using ESSER funds. It is not certain if ESSER funds will be available for future years.

Overall, without additional funding, our future forecasts are showing a higher chance of bad weather for our district. This information and more can be found on our district webpage and is discussed within our public Board Meetings.
