ETHS COMMUNITY PROJECT









East Troy Community School District values authentic learning opportunities and community partnerships. Recently the construction classes at East Troy High School, through the Technical Education Department, worked with James R. Taylor and Sons Inc., Fox Plumbing and Water Care, and Lemberg Electric Company to build two half walls in the high school hallway.

With a focus on real-world applications, the Technical Education Department sought out projects that needed to be completed within the school. The class worked with Robert Ellis, the District's Building and Grounds Supervisor, along with John Linneman, Lead High School Custodian, to ensure the scope of the project would work well for the class. With their assistance, the class learned about asbestos removal, which was completed by a separate contractor. Once the area was prepped for work, the students were able to work with local contractors to complete the project.

James R. Taylor and Sons donated their time and resources to design, create and facilitate the class project. Jim and Stevie Taylor were onsite to assist with the construction, which included the formation and tiling of two half walls in the high school. We appreciate the expertise and experience of Taylor and Sons as they partnered with us throughout the entire process.

Fox Plumbing and Water Care, which is owned by Chris Fox, donated time and resources to remove and reinstall a water fountain located on the retiled wall. Mr. Fox spoke to the students about the field of plumbing including the programming, credentials, and State certifications that are required to be a licensed plumber. He demonstrated and had students assist with the removing and installing of the water fountain.

Operational Referendum

The results of the referendum, balancing the budget, and the future

The East Troy Community School District held a referendum election on April 7th, 2020 with the question of whether the District's budget should exceed the revenue limit by \$1,600,000 per year beginning the school year of 2020-21 and ending the school year of 2024-25 for non-recurring purposes consisting of maintenance, operation expenses, safety and security, and facilities improvements.

The referendum presented to the voters did not pass. The final results were 2,532 votes for no and 1,887 votes for yes.

Budget Balancing Procedures

As a result, immediate decisions were made in order to balance the budget for the upcoming 2020-21 school year. These decisions presented at the April 20th Board Meeting include the following reductions:

- MS Computers .5 FTE
- 5th Grade Section 1.0 FTE
- Teaching and Learning/G&T/Summer School Coordinator 1.0 FTE
- World Language Teacher 1.0 FTE
- HS Science 1.0 FTE
- Business Manager .2 FTE
- HS Study Hall Aide Reduction

In addition to position cuts, other large reductions included health insurance savings.

Future Years

These reductions still don't solve our problems. Declining enrollment and limited state funding means each year our expenses are more than our revenues. Without an operational referendum, greater reductions will likely be necessary to balance future budgets. We are projecting a yearly \$470,000 operational deficit in the years to come. Deferred maintenance will only compound this situation.

Finally, due to further possible budget reductions and unknowns related to COVID and reduced tax revenues, 19-20 salaries have been frozen into 20-21 in order to help mitigate reductions to state revenues in 20-21.



I can not express enough the pride I feel in our staff of the East Troy Community School District. They have done an incredible job over the past several months, starting with the emergency move to remote learning and providing meals to families in March through June. Since then, efforts were done to support a summer graduation ceremony that incorporated a range of mitigation strategies, virtual summer school, district-wide implementation of mitigation measures, and the development of a re-entry plan for this fall that supports students, families, and staff. Thanks to these efforts of so many, we have a re-entry plan that meets our objective - to create actions that help to reduce exposure and mitigate spread while providing learning environments that support the physiological and psychological health of our students and staff.

In a time of ongoing challenges and uncertainty, the people in our East Troy schools continue to move forward to provide learning environments that cultivate purpose, self-compassion, gratitude, joy, and resilience. As Brene' Brown states, "Daring greatly means the courage to be vulnerable." We recognize that while always working to overcome these obstacles, great moments can be made through strength and perseverance.

In the East Troy Community School District, we aim to empower and engage students in their *learning*. We know that learning can look different depending on the needs and interests of each individual. Our students come to us with varying levels of readiness, passions, backgrounds, and social and emotional needs.

That said, we continue to create learning environments that recognize these differences and the process of learning. Sorting and selecting students should never be embedded in our policies or practices. Rather, we must create conditions through policies and practices to support the learning of each child. This statement may never be more important than it is now, as we ensure students continue to learn during these unprecedented times and beyond.

As I have often stated, our focus is not on making students be good at school, but rather on allowing them to become good *learners*. To do so, we must create conditions that support learner empowered environments through personalization of learning by the learner, not to the learner. It's worth reflecting upon what we witnessed this past spring, when every school district had to quickly transition to emergency virtual learning. It became clear that students were truly reliant upon us for their learning. That many were waiting to be told what to do, how to do it, when to do it, etc. In other words, as George Cuorous says: "Students wait to be assessed. Learners assess themselves."

So reflecting upon that and our conditions, are we about control, compliance, completion, and conformity, which can lead to complacency? Or, are we about increasing student voice within their learning by assisting them with understanding what they are to learn, how they will know if they learned, recognizing how to seek feedback, and using feedback toward continued improvement? We must teach them how to select resources toward ongoing, improved learning, and to maximize the skill of self-reflection toward reaching their full potential. None of this can occur without aligning our current practices toward supporting these learning conditions, and thus increasing creativity, critical thinking, collaboration, communication, depth of content, and curiosity. Ultimately, we create learners, creators, problem solvers, and I would state this is more needed now than ever before.

As A.J. Juliani and John Spencer state within their book, *Empower*: "Our job is not to prepare students for something; our job is to help students prepare themselves for anything." This concept should affect everything we do, not because of the pandemic, but because we believe in creating learners and keeping learning at the center of everything we do.

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As you are well aware, on Tuesday, July 21, the East Troy Board of Education approved the initial plan for re-entry for the 2020-21 school year. This plan has continued to be updated and revised, but it is still our intention to welcome all students back into our buildings five days per week for in-person learning with various mitigation measures and providing a virtual option for families who request or require it.

Additionally, due to the fluid nature of this pandemic, we must be prepared for the possibility of the need to shift our future operational structures for short- or long-term school closures based upon positive cases of COVID-19 or high levels of quarantining due to close contact tracing. We will always be working toward our in-person and virtual learning options, but also will continue to plan for an A/B hybrid model, through which students receive both in-person and virtual learning on different days of the week if ever needed. Furthermore, we will continue to prepare for the possibility that all virtual instruction may be needed at some point during the school year.

As we forge ahead for the betterment of our students, staff, schools, and community, we must anticipate the need to adjust our approach as the school year progresses. We may need to be adaptable when it comes to reducing exposure, mitigating spread, supporting the physiological and psychological health of our students and staff, ensuring empowered learning and high academic achievement, and providing equitable access and learning growth for all.

Finally, thank you for your understanding, compassion, and ongoing support of our students and schools.

School Re-Entry for the 2020-21 School Year

The East Troy Community School District Board of Education on Tuesday, July 21, approved the initial plan for reentry for the 2020 - 2021 school year. We currently plan to have all students invited back into our buildings five days per week for in-person learning, with a virtual learning option available to families who want or require it.

In addition, we are providing flexibility to scheduling and individual courses between in-person and virtual learning to assist families and student needs, along with assisting our district capacity toward supporting our mitigation measures; especially physical distancing.

We invite our community members to view our Re-Entry Presentation, as well as the extensive District Re-Entry Handbook available on our website. The Handbook provides convenient FAQs, detailed information on operations, instruction, and safety measures, and will be updated to reflect any new information.

Through any circumstance, our East Troy Community School District is committed to supporting the health and safety of students and staff while ensuring empowered learning, high academic achievement, equitable access and learning and growth for all.



Along with physical distancing and other mitigation measures, GPS Needlepoint Bi-Polar lonization Systems have been installed in every building in order to remove viruses within the indoor air.



Students who choose virtual learning will be provided with LIVE, real-time video streaming and instruction from their classroom teachers.



Custodial staff have been hard at work cleaning, constructing barriers, and preparing spaces for a safe return.
